

RIFFIANS MAY JOIN PRETENDER.

Sultan of Morocco, However, Sends His
Uncle to Adjust Grievances of
the Tribesmen.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—Advices which show that the rebellion in Morocco still has vitality are contained in a dispatch from the correspondent of The Times at Tangier.

"The messenger whom I sent to Riff," he says, "has returned and states that letters from the pretender to the throne have been publicly read in the mosques and the markets, and the general feeling is in favor of support of the rebellion."

The Riffians are doubtless influenced in this attitude, adds the correspondent, by the unpopularity of the Government's representatives there, who are accused of excessive corruption in their conduct of affairs.

Amarina Shereef, uncle of the Sultan, has been instructed to go to Riff and will leave on Saturday on this mission. He is empowered to change all the unpopular Governors and do everything possible to prevent the spread of the rebellion.
