

## ADB-EL-KRIM ON ISLAND.

### Former Riffian Leader Reaches His Exile Home on Reunion.

PARIS, Oct. 15 (AP).—Abd-el-Krim, former Riffian war lord, has arrived at his place of exile on Reunion Island in the Indian Ocean, the Ministry of Colonies announced today. No incidents occurred during the long voyage from Morocco or on the disembarking of the surrendered chieftan.

Reunion rises 9,000 feet out of the sea and, although it is near the Tropic of Capricorn, the climate is mild, never insufferably hot like its neighbor, Madagascar, and never cold. The island is free of snakes and tropical pests.

The home selected for Abd-el-Krim is called Hellbourg. It consists of a spacious well-built house located on the side of a hill. There are several smaller houses belonging to the estate to care for extra wives and other members of his party.

France sent the Queen of Madagascar, Ranavalomandjaka to Reunion in 1848. Several years later the Sultan of the Comores in Northwestern Madagascar was sent there by the French, when he rebelled against them. After him came the Kings of Annam, in Indo-China, two of them, father and son.

### Friends Celebrate Tenth Anniversary of Children's Concerts.

Some sedate elders and a few of the 100,000 children who have attended Walter Damrosch's Symphony Concerts for Children during the last decade called at his home yesterday and presented a large bouquet of American Beauty roses to the conductor.

The occasion marked the tenth anniversary of the children's concerts. Originated by Mr. Damrosch in 1916, the idea of these concerts has spread as far as Europe, where London has a series modeled after them and Paris musicians have planned the same.

George Gartlan, director of music for the New York public schools, who was present at yesterday's little reception, praised the action of the Symphony Society of New York in providing a section of seats at these concerts for the free use of children from the city's schools.
