## ANOTHER BATTLE AT MELILLA.

The Riffians Attack the Spaniards Under the Walls of the Town.

MADRID, Nov. 7 .- The fighting at Melilla was renewed yesterday. The Ritians blocked the approaches to the forts and advanced close to Melilla itself. So close were they that bullets from their rifles fell into the square in the centre of the town. The Spanish troops poured a hot fire into the enemy, but it had no effect in checking their advance.

checking their advance. On the beach close under the walle of the town a number of sailors and dragoons were employed in disembarking horses from one of the steamers that brought supplies from Spain. The Riffians approached to within 200 yards of them and then opened fire, forcing them to stop their work and fies to the town for safety. At night further endeavors were made to dis-ombark the horses and other supplies from the steamer. The electric light was used, but it was soon found that this afforded the Riffians an excellent opportunity to pick off the Span-larda. Their fire was redoubled and the work had to stop.

larda. Their fire was redoubled and the work had to stop. Convoys dispatched with rations and water to the ontlying forts are in great danger of ex-termination. The Riffians attack them and it is only by desperate fighting that the supplies are carried through. The enemy is now engaged in destroying the roads. This will make the con-veyance of supplies extremely difficult. The Correspondencia states that if the strug-gle in Morocce is prolonged Spain will declare war on the Sultan and make the affair on the Riff coast a secondary consideration.
